Role of the School Nurse in Providing School Health Services

Role of the School Nurse in Providing School Health Services

- Policy calls for a minimum of one full-time registered nurse in every School.



Role of the School Nurse in Providing School Health Services

- Policy says the school nurse’s job comprises much more than just health services. They monitor more children with special needs and help with management of ADHD, diabetes, life threatening allergies, asthma and seizures.



Role of the School Nurse in Providing School Health Services

- Policy encourages pediatric providers to include school contact information within the student’s EHR record and share relevant information with the school nurse



Role of the School Nurse in Providing School Health Services

- Policy says that collaboration among pediatric providers, families, and the school medical team is increasingly critical to optimal health care in both office and community settings.

Utah Dept of Health, Bureau of Children with Special Health Care Needs (CSHCN) is currently working on a 3 year Systems Integration grant

–Shared Plan of Care project: sharing the Plan of Care for children with complex needs with others on their care team. This could and should include School Nurses.

  

The Utah Children’s Care Coordination Network (UCCCN)

- formed in late 2014 to be a source of information, resources, tools, expert advice, peer learning and support for pediatric care coordinators
- Supported by the Bureau of CSHCN
- Involved in the Shared Plan of Care project under the Bureau of CSHCN Systems Integration grant.
